God as Being exists in community. The natural and simple demonstration of God’s communal image for humanity is the gathering of the small group. The surest thing I took away from my BSW, MSW, and Ph.D. in social work is this: connection is why we’re here. We are hardwired to connect with others, it’s what gives purpose and meaning to our lives, and without it there is suffering. (Brené Brown, *Daring Greatly*)

When I ask students from non-Christian homes what brought them into relationships with Jesus, the top responses involve community. Whether they’re invited to youth group by a believing friend, or stumbling into Christian community on their own, most students I ask confirm that relationships with others serve as a precursor to a relationship with God.
